Agility Tip: Setting Up Our New Equipment

Thank you to all that came out to the fundraiser and made it possible for PCOTC to acquire a brand new Dog Walk and A-frame! This equipment is absolutely top of the line and we are lucky to have it at the club. It also can be fragile and we want to make sure it is well taken care of. So following are step-by-step instructions for how to properly use the equipment so we can all work hard to make sure it is well maintained.

The Dog Walk

When being stored and used, make sure the wheels are locked (the locks are pushed down (vertical) on all four wheels). The ramps should also be resting on the ground and the cross bars should be up with the s-ring attached to the pocket underneath the center ramp of the dog walk. To move the dog walk, lower the cross bars so they are resting on the supports. Raise the ramps one at a time, slowly, until you hear a click. This means the up ramp is locked in place. Unlock the wheels and move with caution. When in place,

lock all four wheels and lower the ramps. To do so, lift up gently until you hear a click and lower slowly. Then raise the cross bar back up and set the s ring on the pocket underneath the middle

Do not put your hands/fingers anywhere near the hinge of the down ramps.

The A-frame

The A-frame can be stored on its wheels or not. To move the A-frame, push down on the longest lever underneath the A-frame. This will raise it onto its wheels. Repeat on the other side. Again, move with caution. To lower off of the wheels, simply lift the small lever up on both sides.

Thank you again to all who made it possible for the club to make these upgrades. We hope you and your pups enjoy the new equipment. Please handle with care and happy training!

Obedience Tip: Help. Volunteer.

The best way to learn about the sport you are in is to be a volunteer. There are many opportunities to learn about Rally and Obedience. PCOTC hosts a number of sanctioned trials and matches. We are always in need of members who can help out on the day of these events. You don't need any experience because the experienced people or judges will help you learn the ropes of being a "Ring Steward." You will be able to observe up close and personal the individual runs the show and match participants. You can see some of the experienced exhibitors as well as those just starting out. How they enter the ring and

set up for each exercise. Observe the connection between the best teams and those who seem to be having a little difficulty. You can even ask the judges or other Ring Stewards questions that will help you learn the rules. All of this can be done before you make your own ring debut. Know the rules and experience how a trial is run without your dog.

Our match coordinator is Joanne Sheffler. Our trial steward coordinator is Morgaana Menzel. They will be sending email notices through the Club's web site announcing when to sign up for stewarding posts. We also will need volunteers to perform other tasks for trials like hospitality, set up and clean up. The trial chairperson will be soliciting volunteers for these and other positions close to the trial dates (in the beginning of November, March and end of July). The obedience committee is always happy to get new and experienced members to help grow our obedience program and help with our events. Without volunteers we can't continue to provide a good practice and trial setting for our future and seasoned competitors. If you need more information or want to get involved, ask your current or past instructor. They will help point you in the right direction.

Obedience

Rally Tip: Changing Behavior by Ann Mandelbaum, CPDT-KA

I've written more columns for *Sit 'N Stay* than I care to remember, so please excuse me if I return to a subject that I have covered before. This time I will come at it from a somewhat different direction that will make a light bulb go on for someone who was previously unimpressed. Luring — leading a dog literally by his nose into performing a behavior you want him to learn — is often a quick, convenient way to jump-start that new behavior. But for many handlers it is so seductively easy to produce the desired result that it is very hard to foreswear that tasty little treat in your hand.

It would have been better not to have fallen into this trap in the first place, but if you find yourself ensnared, what to do next?

First, make up your mind you will take control of the situation.

Now, choose a behavior to start working on. Let's arbitrarily choose perch work, a very useful exercise for Rally with all its tight turns in heel position, and one in which I've often observed people luring well after they should have stopped! (If this is not where you have encountered this problem, transfer the method to whatever behavior you prefer.)

Your dog pivots beautifully in front, clockwise or counterclockwise, understanding that he should maintain a perpendicular orientation in front of you. He loves

perching! As long as you hold a cookie in your hands in front of you showing him where his nose should be. The minute the lure goes away he loses interest, doesn't respond, never quite reaches perpendicular, whatever.

Clearly, this is a dog who sees the cookie as an integral part of the behavior, so how to change his mind?

Set up: Toss a treat or do whatever you do to begin the behavior. Observe yourself very carefully. Do one full turn in whatever direction is easiest for your dog and reset.

Repeat.

Again, observe yourself. Be sure you know exactly what you do as you begin, circle and return to the spot you started from with a perfect front. Now reset and do exactly the same thing you did the last two times, but with no lure in your hands. Every move you make must be exactly the same, your voice must not change, you should reach for the lure but just not take it. Nothing changes except there is no lure!

Now it is crucial that you watch your dog closely. If you are lucky, he will perform the whole behavior, in which case when you complete your circle with a perfect front, you will click and deliver a huge jackpot, play a bit and repeat.

If you are even luckier, at some point, perhaps even at the very beginning, he will

become unsure, hesitant. The good thing about this is that you know he realizes there is no treat, so you can get right into helping him get over his dependence on it. You must be observant and ready to reward and encourage any move in the right direction no matter how small. Don't think to yourself "that really didn't mean anything" or "he really didn't do that on purpose." Just reward/encourage anything. There is a fine line here. You must refrain from trying to put pressure on your dog to continue while rewarding and praising any move he offers in the right direction. In other words, you have switched from luring to shaping.

Since your dog does understand the behavior itself, as he is rewarded for approximations in the desired direction he may move quickly to finding the behavior again. Then again, if he has become really invested in those cookies as an integral part of the process, it may be hard for him to let them go. Only careful observation and leadership over time will finally work. But once he really is convinced that he doesn't have to see the reward to be sure he will get the reward, he will be able to generalize and you will not have to go through such an elaborate procedure many times.

Just hold your ground, don't ever resort to bringing out a treat to encourage a known behavior again. But do be willing to nudge any behavior back into confident performance with shaping techniques. And have fun!

Obedience & Rally Run-Thrus

"White Plains Weekends" (Obedience Match Shows) and Rally Run-Thrus are scheduled on Sundays, on the same dates. Our Obedience Match Shows run from 8:30 am to 1:00 pm. Rally Runthrus are held in the afternoons from 2 to 5 pm. Both obedience and rally match shows are held indoors, with AC/heat, on Sundays.

Here are our dates for Fall 2019:

- December 8

White Plains Weekends:

We will offer Novice, Open, and Utility timed entries of 10 minutes each. It's a good idea to plan to enter the run-thrus before the trials.

Our run-thrus only work if we have the support of volunteers joining us to steward and judge. Anyone can volunteer and we can teach you how to steward! Volunteer hours and one free run-thru are offered to our volunteers. It is an excellent opportunity to watch training teams up close, both the beginners and those competing on the higher levels of competition. Six volunteers are needed for each match. This year, again, all registration for obedience run-thrus will be done through www.dogmatchshows.com. Each obedience run is

\$10 for Novice, Open, and/or Utility, plus a \$2 handling fee. The major advantage is the ability to choose your time slot. In the event that you cannot make your scheduled entry, send a friend. There will be no refunds or carrying over to the next match.

Rally Run-Thrus:

Registration for rally run-thrus will be handled via Jotform at www.Jotform.com at \$10 per run, and one free run will be available to volunteers.

Time allotted for run-thrus is depending on the class:

- 5 minutes per run for Novice, Intermediate, and Advanced.
- 7 minutes for Master and Excellent.

There will be a two-ring setup, with Novice through Advanced in one ring and Master-Excellent in the second ring.

Four to six volunteers are needed to run each rally run-thru date. If you'd like to volunteer and earn some hours, please sign up at the Rally Run-Thru Volunteer Sign Up. In addition to credited hours, volunteers may have one free run-thru.

Club Reminders

DOGS IN CLASS: Unless instructed otherwise by the class instructor, students should crate their dogs when not working, or have them on leash in close proximity.

PARKING: Students/Renters are not permitted to park in the lot behind PCOTC during weekday hours. You may park in the lot after 5:00 p.m. weekdays, and on weekends. If parking in the lot, your car must be in a designated space; you may not park next to the ramp. Please be aware that illegally parked cars are subject to towing.

CLEANUP: Please be aware of where your dog's nose is (if they are looking at it, they are thinking about it) when entering and exiting the facility, as well as what his/her rear end is doing!

For dogs in season, please make sure panties are worn when inside the facility. Please clean up any bodily fluids thoroughly with the appropriate agents and if they eliminate on the outside stairs/deck, please rinse it off. Thank you for your help in keeping PCOTC clean!

Family Manners Tip: Where to Go? by Cindy Rubin, CPDT-KA

At the beginning of a Foundations course there are usually the same questions on the owners' minds. How do I get my dog to walk on a leash, not jump up, come when called, not bark in his crate. By the end of the session, these questions should have been tackled. Notice I didn't say answered! Every dog is different and every dog will respond to training methods in different ways. What works for one team may not work for another in the same way.

Every team will progress at its own rate and will have particular strengths and weaknesses. That is why it is so important to continue on with FM Skills. Besides introducing new skills, it is a great course for strengthening the behaviors and learning theory introduced in Foundations. The behaviors are practiced with distractions and with greater duration. For example: your dog can sit, but can it stay? Will it come to you when there are other dogs in the room? These issues are answered in Skills.

In the latter classes of a Skills course, dog sports that will be open to teams are introduced.

• There are courses offered by Family Man-

ners such as "Ricochet Recalls," and "Off Leash Walking."

- A logical step from Skills is the Canine Good Citizen (CGC) course. The joy in passing your first "test" is amazing! There are pamphlets at the facility that describe the CGC requirements, and courses are offered throughout the year.
- The Tricks class is always fun. Dogs like tricks it's a game! Your instructor can help you with training trick behaviors. There is now Trick Dog titling. There are suggested tricks for your dog to perform or make up your own!

PCOTC offers training in many dog sports.

- Obedience is definitely one path to take if you truly love that feeling of oneness with your dog. New behaviors are taught and ways of perfecting known behaviors are explored. There are many levels of training in obedience, all leading to a great partnership with your dog.
- One offshoot of obedience is Rally. This combines the skills of obedience heeling, turns, the ability to hold a position, and

jumping with the challenge of ever-changing courses.

- Agility! This dog sport is all about athleticism, for the dog and the handler. Young dogs, while not jumping their full jump height, can participate in Foundation classes where the basics are taught. There are classes that follow that concentrate on jumping and contact equipment training, still at an introductory level. Even if you don't want to compete (your mind could change), these classes give a very energetic dog a place to learn and focus. Our agility team offers classes for beginner and competitor alike.
- Nosework. For those of you unfamiliar with this sport, it's all about your dog's ability to "find" scented objects. This is great for dogs that are independent thinkers and for dogs that need to gain more independence. It's fun and fast paced. Starting off with building your dog's hunting ability, the classes soon teach them to identify certain odors in new situations.

Always be open to new avenues of training with your dogs. Happy training!

Has your dog prepared for a CGC, via the AKC's Canine Good Citizen Test, at PCOTC? As of this year, one million dogs have received a CGC designation by passing the AKC's Canine Good Citizen Test. Mary Burch, Director of the Canine Good Citizen Program, says "Many of these dogs go on for additional training to make a difference in the lives of others."

The CGC program was started in 1988. The 10-step test consists of basic commands and actions like accepting a friendly stranger, sitting, staying, coming when called,

walking through a crowd, and behaving politely around other dogs, among others.

The Canine Good Citizen Program has been adopted and utilized for many activities that require basic good citizen behavior. CGC training and titles are used as a prerequisite by some therapy dog groups. Many service dog organizations start their dogs with CGC training, and shelter organizations are utilizing the "CGC Ready" program to demonstrate that their rescue dogs are good citizens.

Currently, PCOTC offers classes for the CGC, as well as for Community Canine Prep (CGCA) and Urban Canine Good Citizen Prep (CGCU). I remember taking my first CGC test years ago at PCOTC, shortly after the program began. Passing the CGC helped me decide to train some of my dogs for therapy dog work.

Best of Breed Handling

Talking Hands by Fran Hellman, CPDT-KA

How and where you place your hands on your dog says a lot to the judge. Here are some tips on how you can non-verbally communicate to the judge while you are exhibiting your dog in the show ring.

Do's:

- Show your dog as though he is your prized possession.
- Exude confidence and your dog will, too.
- Hold the lead properly.
- Properly position the collar of the show
- Place your dog on the examination table as though you are setting down a fine piece of china.
- Use "soft" hands.
- Use a minimum of hand motions.
- Control your dog by gently controlling
- Be deliberate but gentle while hand stacking your dog.
- Hold the collar of the show lead carefully while hand stacking and baiting.
- Use subtle hand movements to draw attention to your dog's virtues, such as,

- stroking his fabulous topline (only a few times and when the judge is looking, but you are not looking at the judge!).
- Train your dog to know a verbal cue for showing the teeth (the bite) to the judge. You might say "teeth," before you reach to show his teeth carefully and properly to
- Move your dog around the ring so he is able to gait freely. If he is being unruly, stay calm, get through it and then go home and do some more training.

Don'ts:

- Don't disconnect with your dog. Remember that he is your teammate.
- Don't fuss over your dog's faults; it will only draw attention to them.
- Don't show that you're nervous by setting up your dog in a frenzy.
- Don't move the collar of the show lead every which way when you are setting up vour dog.
- Don't take out your frustrations on your
- · Don't grab, yank, pull, or yell at your dog.

- Don't plop your dog on the examination
- Don't reach over your dog with your right hand to set any leg other than his front
- Don't catch your dog off guard by abruptly reaching over his muzzle to show the judge his bite.
- Don't give unnecessary lead corrections.

Breed handling classes are now offered every Wednesday at 8:15 p.m. in the upper level of our club. Drop-in only—Registration is not required. Nose & Scent Work

Big Changes to AKC Scent Work Rules for Competitors

You just get all those rules committed to memory and what happens? They change them! So, you are therefore obliged to adjust your expectations about training and trialing, also. What else can we do?

There will be some big changes to Scent Work trial rules coming to us as of October 1, and I, for one, welcome them. Scent Work is still a very new sport and, as a result of competitor and host input, the AKC is responding by making some well-thought-out changes.

Buried Class

All levels will use tubs and substrate. (Excellent and Master will no longer be outside, buried in the ground.)

The odor in all classes will be buried four inches deep.

Novice – Six tubs of play sand with one hide

Advanced – Eight tubs of water with two hides

Excellent – Twelve tubs: six with play sand and six with water

Master - Sixteen tubs: eight play sand and eight water (1-4 hides)

Increase Consistency

There will be required separation between active search areas.

Any physical barrier must be at least six feet tall and reaching all the way to the ground.

There must be a physical barrier between crating and searching areas.

No more than seven hides can be in the search area in a set of trials.

Nesting searches will not be allowed.

Prohibits using an area that has been used with odor from being used as a blank area during a set of trials.

Items placed in "rows" must be parallel straight lines.

Restructure High in Trial

Handler Discrimination classes are not included in High in Trial calculations.

If HIT is offered, clubs must also offer High Combined Division, which includes all odor classes plus Handler Discrimination.

Volunteers

Guaranteed entry for show workers is only allowed with the Random Draw method. Maximum of 15% of the total entry may be guaranteed. Guaranteed entries must be read at the draw.

No Special Accommodations for "Reactive" Dogs

Clubs may dictate lining up and staging of

competitors as they see fit, but it must be the same for all dogs.

No blanket rules that dogs are not allowed to interact, except in staging areas or warm-up areas.

My students have been practicing these changes for the past few months and we have found that using sand instead of soil works just fine. The introduction of water hides is *amazing!* All the dogs seem to master this medium easily and handlers enjoy it, too! You just have to be careful about spilling the water. The fact that our canine companions can actually source out odor under water just blows people away. This really gives the dogs a chance to show off!

Regarding the trialing of reactive dogs. You really must use your common sense. If your dog simply cannot be within several feet of any other dog without lunging, barking or reacting in general, an active trialing situation where people are not paying attention to their dogs is probably not the best environment for your team. This activity is supposed to be fun, and if your hyper-vigilance is required every minute and your dog is exhibiting extreme symptoms of stress, it can't be fun for either of you. Which brings me to several rules for handling your dog outside of the search area: Keep your dog on a short leash. Please do not walk your dog aimlessly around the trial area. Your dog should remain safely restrained in your car unless he is either going to or from the potty area or walking to or from the search area. It's not what your dog will do as much as what the other dog, whose owner's eyes wander for just a second, will do. No one at the trial wants anything bad to happen to your team, so please be your dog's best advocate and make their safety your primary concern that day.

Go online and download a copy of the new rules in the pretty yellow cover. Be sure you know all the changes, so you can add them to your training routines. Good luck, and I hope to see you at a trial soon!

Obedience Trials demonstrate the dog's ability to follow specified routines in the obedience ring and emphasize the usefulness of the dog as a companion to humankind. Each level of obedience competition – Novice, Open, and Utility – requires mastering a specific skill set, which increase in difficulty, before advancing to the next level. The Novice class demonstrates good

canine companion skills such as heeling, both with and without a leash, coming when called, standing for a simple physical examination, and staying in both a sit and a down position with a group of dogs. The Open class is more challenging as more exercises are done off leash and retrieving and jumping challenges are added. The Utility class, which includes scent discrimina-





Volunteering Explained

Volunteers run all PCOTC activities except dog training, for which we pay qualified instructors. We ask each club member to volunteer a minimum of 12 hours during each club year (January 1 to December 31). Those who complete the minimum of 12 hours receive special Member Volunteer rates that provide year-round savings on all group classes.

In order to receive the special volunteer rates for a club year, members must complete their volunteer hours prior to the beginning of that club year.

Volunteer hours do not "carry over" from year to year. Each member in a family membership needs credit for 12 volunteer hours, but family members may credit hours to another person in the membership.

New club members must complete 6 volunteer hours prior to submitting their application for membership, and are eligible for the Volunteer Member privileges immediately upon admission to the club. They then must complete an additional 6 hours prior to the end of the club year to receive Volunteer Member status for the next year.

It is your responsibility to report your volunteer hours via a PCOTC Volunteer Reporting Form, kept in stock at the facility. The form is also available for download from the Membership page of our web site,

Volunteer members who log in 30+ hours in a club/fiscal year are considered "Super Volunteers" who will be honored at the annual club meeting and given a Certificate of Appreciation.
